ON THE FIELD-THE SEASON SO FAR

After our disappointing end to last season, when lack of goal scoring became a telling factor, it was hoped that this season would be better in that respect. Unfortunately, so far, this hasn't been the case.

Things looked promising during the summer with the signings of the legend that is Ade Akinfenwa plus Dayle Southwell (54 goals for Boston in his last two seasons), Paris Cowan-Hall and Myles Weston. Along with keeper Scott Brown, defender Will De Haviland and forward Nick Freeman, also from non-league football at Histon we seemed to have assembled a good squad.

However, both Cowan-Hall and Freeman, along with Paul Hayes and Danny Rowe, were injured in pre-season (do we play too many games?) On top of this, Weston lasted all of ten minutes at Crawley in our opening game before limping off, while Brown and Luke O'Nien also sustained injuries!

After a reasonable first half, when



we had shots blocked in the area, we deteriorated after Crawley grabbed a goal on the break.

An excellent display against Bristol City in the League Cup at Adams Park followed. Only a string of saves from their goalkeeper, Richard O'Donnell, denied us a well-deserved win.

Two more home games came in quick succession. A last-gasp goal from Anthony Stewart saw a win over Grimsby, although I'm convinced the big fella's header was already over the line.

He soon opened his account with an early goal against Accrington, where we once more faded after a good first half.

Next, in atrocious conditions more in keeping with November, we gained a hard-fought point at Blackpool.

As the injuries continued to mount up though we then gave a bitterly disappointing display to lose at home to old foes Colchester.

This was followed by our heaviest

defeat for some time at Luton. It extended our winless run away from home to 12 games. Hopefully, we can soon get some of our players back from injury and move back up the league table.

The one bright spot in all of this has been the 400th appearance of Matt Bloomfield, who made his debut against Rushden & Diamonds on 28th December 2003. In this day and age of football mercenaries, this is a wonderful achievement. Well done Matt !

FOOTBALL MATTERS

It seems that each season the powers that be come up with crazy ideas to spoil our wonderful game. This summer they have surpassed themselves!

First of all there is the renaming (or should I say re-branding) of the Football League to the EFL. Why? Ever since its formation in 1888 it has been known as the Football League and nobody has ever seen the need to alter this and I still don't. It's just change for changes sake. I also wonder how Cardiff and Newport supporters feel about playing in the English Football League!

Then there is the madness that is the Football League Trophy with the inclusion of Academy teams. On the League's website it is stated that it is to help the development of young players for the England team. Most of these Academies however include several foreign players, while



competition rules say that only six of the starting line-up has to be under 21!

Can someone explain to me therefore how this helps the England set-up. Also the format is made up of groups of four so each club will play at least three midweek games. This flies in the face of the League's new idea of an extra division in the League, with just 20 teams in each. One of their reasons is to cut down on money-losing midweek games!! The last straw for me is that if a group game ends in a draw, there will be a penalty shoot-out for an extra point! I personally see no value in a game between ourselves and any team's Academy side and am not alone in this. There are a lot of Clubs' supporters out there who intend to boycott this competition as there has been no consultation with them by their Clubs and they don't want to see Academy teams. Even a lot of the Premier teams' supporters are against it. It would be interesting to hear your views.

My final grouse is that if a FA Cup tie goes to extra time teams can bring

on a fourth substitute. The FA website states that this will bring intrigue and excitement to the game. How on earth do they work that one out ? In light of the injury problems that we have had both last season and this, teams are lucky that they have enough players on the bench to bring on an extra sub!
