Five years ago on the first Saturday in November we continued our good start to the League Two season with a 2-1 win at Oxford United. Danny Hylton, from the penalty spot, gave them an interval lead.

However, second half goals from Paul Hayes and Peter Murphy (both in a rich vein of form) saw us to victory.

Our line-up was : Ingram, Jombati, Jacobson, Scowen, Mawson, Pierre, Bloomfield (Kretschmar, Murphy, Hayes (Rowe), Craig (Ephraim), Wood.

Ten years ago saw us struggling at the wrong end of League One and, when Walsall visited Adams Park, we had one just the one win in 14 games. Gary Waddock had recently been appointed manager after the dismissal of Peter Taylor and he must have been pleased at half-time as two goals from Reading loanee Scott Davies, the second a stunning 40-yarder, saw us in the driving seat. However, defensive frailties saw that lead evaporate as Walsall went on to win 3-2.

The team line-up was: Shearer, Hunt, Woodman, L. Johnson, Duberry, Davies, Betsy, Doherty, Harrold (Pittman), Zebroski (Bloomfield), M. Phillips. The attendance that afternoon was 5,046.

Twenty years ago it was F. A. Cup weekend and a home game against non-league opposition Oxford City, old rivals from our Isthmian League days. They proved more than

worthy opponents and it took until the 66th minute to break them down with a goal from Michael Simpson. They weren't beaten though and Pierson equalised with five minutes left.

The replay, ten days later, was also played at Adams Park and finished 1-1 after extra time. However, just as the penalty shoot-out was about to get under way, a fire was reported in the away end and the game was abandoned for safety reasons! It turned to be nothing serious though, just a small electrical fire that was faulty. When the game was re-staged, it was at Oxford United's Manor Ground (sadly long gone) and a single goal from Steve Brown finally saw off the plucky non-leaguers.



It saddens me at the ever-increasing reports of racism in the game at all levels and it is about time that the various football authorities clamped down hard on the offenders, instead of the token fines and games being played behind closed doors, etc.

Countries and Clubs should be thrown out of cup competitions and banned from entering them again until they get their act together if it's proved their supporters are guilty. Perhaps points deductions for repeated offences during league matches may make clubs take things seriously. I realise the problem is not confined to football but wouldn't it be good for the sport to lead the way in addressing it.
