FOOTBALL MATTERS

Those of you with E-Mail should have received a message from Lynden, with a link to a survey supplied by the Football Supporters' Federation. I would like to think that you all filled in it.

It is very important to let the powers that be know the views of supporters all over the Country.

There are several ideas being bandied around under the heading Whole Game Solution, including a winter break, no replays in the latter rounds of the F. A. Cup, the moving of some rounds to midweek and the restructuring of the Football League.

Now to me a solution is an answer to a problem. I can't see there are too many problems for clubs such as us, except the poor distribution of money filtering down. Most of the proposals I have seen are only for the benefit of the big clubs, so I don't know where the Whole Game name comes from.

Thankfully, the League itself are against a break and, for any changes made, a 90% majority is needed. Do any of us really think the Premier boys would have a break anyway? No, they would be flying off to the Middle and Far East for lucrative friendlies. The concern for me about the F. A. Cup is that I believe that the F. A. want to eventually do away with replays altogether to appease the big clubs. That would mean no more wonderful occasions like Grimsby and Selhurst Park (2001) and last season at Villa Park. When I was a teenager we reached the First Round in 1966/67 and were drawn



at home to Bedford Town. There followed a wonderful saga of four matches (no limit on replays then). We eventually lost 3-2 at Bedford in that fourth game after so much drama as each game ebbed and flowed. The attendances were 7,488, 7,641, 8,821 and 8,105. How we would welcome those figures now!
