FOOTBALL MATTERS

Please note that this article is entirely how I see things and not the Association's view. A few weeks ago I had an unhappy experience at an away game, where I was treated aggressively by a steward before the game itself and threatened with being removed from the ground. Although I discovered at half-time it

had been complete a misunderstanding, at no time did he apologise to me and I had spent an uncomfortable first 45 under his glare. This episode upset me and got me thinking how different it is at football matches for supporters in this country to our counterparts in other parts of Europe. Lynden and I have been to several games in both Spain and Italy, while I regularly watch games in the latter, plus France, Germany, Belgium and Portugal on television. What comes over is a carnival-like atmosphere with a mass of colour. It seems as though nearly everyone wears their club colours in some form or other. I hesitate to say this but flares are prevalent, along with gigantic banners (that cover entire sections) and huge flags. Supporters are allowed to drink alcohol on the terraces and in the stands. Each club cheerleader has a with megaphone. His job is to spend the game with his back to the action and lead the singing and chanting, which often is continuous throughout the entire game. These people are often actually paid by the home club to do this! A lot of



clubs, even at the very top, have terracing (replaced by retractable seating for UEFA games) and to see the bank at Borussia Dortmund, where 25,000 bounce up and down in unison is amazing to watch. At Koln FC (Cologne) in the Bundesliga, the mascot is a real live mountain goat and he spends the whole game on the touchline with his handler. At Nice, in the French Ligue 1, they have an eagle that flies around the ground before the game. Also when Lynden and I attended a game at Viktoria Zizkov, on the outskirts of Prague, there was a dog, clad in his team's colours, which was allowed to wander freely around the home end.

Please note that I am not trying to be controversial here, just stating that the above are actual facts and do happen. The authorities there obviously have a more laid-back attitude then ours. I'm also not necessarily advocating any of these things happening here but do wish were allowed to vou eniov yourselves more at games. After all that's why we go isn't it? I realise that we have had dreadful hooligan

problems in the past and there is still an underlining current around but we have not been alone in this. Most of the above countries have also had their fair share.

Footnote - My offence at that away game was that I was attempting to take a photograph of their lovely old-fashioned main stand!
