
We have sadly lost several of our ex-players as well as fellow supporters, all of whom will be sorely missed. None more so than our very own Sandie Derben.

Weston, in fact, only lasted 13 minutes before being replaced by Matt Bloomfield, while Brown's injury wasn't discovered fully until after the match. Ten years ago, we were newly promoted to League One and started with a home fixture against Scunthorpe. James Tunnicliffe, Joel Grant and John Halls were debutants and Tunnicliffe got off to a perfect start by heading home from a corner in the 23rd minute. The visitors equalised five minutes before the interval and that's how it finished, although Gareth Ainsworth was unlucky when his shot hit the post early in the second half. Following a fracas involving several players in stoppage time, Ben Strevens was dismissed for a second yellow card. we lined up as follows: Bull, Foster, Sandell, Halls, Winfield, Tunnicliffe, Ainsworth (Beavon), Strevens, Rendell, Donnelly, Grant (K. Harris)

Going back twenty years, the opening Division Two (now League one) fixture took us to Cardiff's old Ninian Park Stadium. In front of a crowd of 17,000 we lost again by the only goal, scored by Gabbidon in the 17th minute. After looking for a while that a heavy defeat was on the cards, we fought back and could easily have taken a point. The line-up was: Taylor, Cousins, Vinnicombe, Rogers, P.
